First of all, thank you for offering us some time to answer our questions. We appreciate it very much.

How would you describe and evaluate the studies at AESM?

Studies at AESM have been challenging. At that time it was a transition from one system to the other. Moreover, we've experienced then how it is to study in a foreign language (French and English in our case). Programs and curricula were evolving and we were working hard to keep up with the change. I recall manuals and books in French and English were rare and very expensive. It was difficult to find research materials Statistics of internal economic and social phenomena was a challenge, because of the reduced reliability. But those were no impediments, just challenges we were keen to face and to overcome.

Mr. Recean, you have a strong professional background, ranging from Lecturer at AESM to Project Manager at ARIA (a World Bank sponsored organization implementing in Moldova and abroad), to Marketing Director at TeleMedia (telecom company), to the Ministry of Information Technology and Communications, to the Ministry of Internal Affairs. What brought about all these changes? One needs to be ready for the challenges and opportunities of the environment they live in. The key is to work hard in any position you are, and to be dedicated to your profession, to face the challenges. It needs discipline to plan thoroughly and determination to deal with the changes

INTERVIEW WITH MIHAELA ALEXA

So, we know that you're the best handball player in the country and we also know that you've lived abroad for a few years. Could you describe your experience and how it affected you as a person and as a player (when, where, how long, what you like/dislike, etc.) I began my practicing sports when I was 12 years old. Everything started out as fun, I hadn't really thought to make a career out of it. But, in time, after noticing my achievements- I realized that handball is what I like and that I'm really good at. I have been named the best attacker of the country for three consecutive years (2007/2008/2009). In 2009, at the age of 19, my team and I won the Championship of the Republic of Moldova. After I graduated high school in 2009, I had several offers to continue my handball career abroad. I chose to go to Poland and spent 3 years there. Although it was a short period of time, I experienced enough happy as well as less pleasant moments. Those 3 years taught me to follow my dreams regardless the obstacles that life could give me. I enjoyed everything I did there and if I were to go back in time I would not change anything.

How did you come to the decision to return home at 23 and pursue a further bachelor's degree?

Well, in 2009 I started my bachelor degree in Law in Chisinau. In 2010, after one year of playing handball abroad, I came home and withdrew my documents from the previous university in order to continue my studies in Poland. I wanted to combine sport and studies. Unfortunately my plans changed after I'd injured my knee. The surgery was the main factor which determined me to come back and renew my bachelor studies here, in Chisinau.







Why IER? Why AESM?

The main reason why I chose IER was that the courses at our faculty are carried in English and I strongly believe that today, to succeed one should know foreign language and to be fluent in this. My second reason was that I'd discussed with some AESM students and they all spoke very highly of this university. In my opinion this is simply the best University in Moldova.

How do you combine sports and studies in order to successfully achieve maximum results in both domains?

My principle is simple: if you have a certain goal in life and know that achieving is difficult, yet you are prepared to put in the work – you will definitely succeed.

What plans do you have for the future as far as sports and studies are concerned?

This year the main goal of my team, Femina Chisinau, is to win the national championship. After obtaining the champion title I will retire from handball and will take up practicing yoga again, because it doesn't include the risk of traumas. Regarding my studies I'll continue doing my best on my bachelor's degree here, in Chisinau, and will continue with a master's degree abroad.

POLISH EXPERIENCE OF STUDYING IN MOLDOVA

Firstly, would you tell us who you are?

Ok, I'm Wojtek, student of the 4th year of International Economic Relations at Cracow University of Economics. I came to Chisinau for the 1st -semester exchange (that's pretty obvious thanks to bilateral exchange agreement between my university and the AESM).

Where are you from?

I'm from Poland . To be more specific I'm from a lovely village called Lubenia, in the suburbs of the city Rzeszów (capital of Podkarpackievoivodship). But now, I have already lived in Kraków for four years, one of the biggest and for sure one of the most famous cities in Poland. Kraków for me is the most beautiful place in the world and of course I invite everyone to visit it

Why did you decide to study in Moldova?

While studying at my university, you have the opportunity to go for an exchange to almost every European country and to many other continents. That's why when I told my friends and family that I'm going to study in Moldova, they were kind of shocked . Students from my university who go for an exchange usually choose countries from the Western Europe – Portugal, Spain, Italy, France, Belgium, Germany and so on. I was never interested in the western culture, which is for me nothing special and "different". I wanted to try something completely new. To be honest, I wanted to go somewhere, where none of my friends have been before. Moldova is completely unknown country in Poland. It was also important to me to go to the city, where I would have the opportunity to improve my Russian, which I started to learn. When only I saw Chisinau on the list, I already knew where to go .

What do you like most about the program of exchange so far?

It's hard to say what I like most about the program, because I'm not feeling here like on an exchange, more like a regular student, but just for one semester. The point is that I'm probably the only one exchange student at AESM (as far as I know; at my university there were 2 places to take, but only I decided to come to Chisinau).I can't say any bad word about the organization and the Academy – from the very beginning I didn't have any problems. My coordinator, teachers and other students were very helpful and friendly (I was shocked, because lots of people offered me their help). Also accommodation conditions were for me surprisingly good. The only thing that I could say I miss the atmosphere of a "real" big exchange (for example from Erasmus Program) – when you have 50 foreign students in your dormitory and the party is rockin' all the time . Mine is maybe calmer, but still cool.

How is the transition from living in Poland to living in Moldova?

Before my arrival here my friends and family had laughed at me that I would need just a 10 euro to buy the half of the Chisinau . So I need to admit that I was quite surprised about the prices here, which are pretty similar to the polish ones (but for example clothes here are much more expensive than in Poland!). I thought in Moldova everything would be even cheaper than in Ukraine , but it's not a problem at all. I can't point many big differences between living in Poland and Moldova – You have here everything that a human being needs to exist . Ok, maybe Chisinau is much different than the polish cities – it hasn't got many touristic places and many buildings and... all the roads are really beginning to get renovated, but this eastern, post-soviet style is interesting to me. Also your mentality is completely different than the polish one - Moldovans focus on completely different aspects of life than Poles, which sometimes I can't understand. I was completely surprised when I saw what cars people are driving here – so new, fancy and - probably – expensive. Huge contrast comparing to the condition of the roads. **What do you think of the educational concept?**

Not much to say – it's almost the same as in Poland, so nothing surprising to me. Just small differences. We also have lectures and obligatory seminars, but the seminars usually are just 2-3 times a month, not every week, like here. The style of teaching is very similar to polish, so nothing else to add.

On February 6th, The Academy of Economic Studies was honored by the visit of his Excellence, Matthias Meyer, the Ambassador of Federal Republic of Germany in the Republic of Moldova. The IER students were very excited about this first great event from 2013. The startup hour was 11:00 a.m. and the host place was a large conference room at the AESM. The conference room was overcrowded, because all future ambassadors from AESM wished to learn from the huge and diversified experience of German Official. Ambassador's first lesson was- punctuality, lesson from which Moldavian students have to learn a lot.

Mr. Meyer began the encounter with presenting himself and his past activities. His story was very captivating and dignified to be written in a book. He studied in Hamburg University, after graduating he went to Chamber of Commerce in India, Bombey to work as a lawyer. However, the destiny arranged the things in a different way, because he met a great lady which convinced him to try the profession of a diplomat. In such way his career began. Mr Ambassador has an unbelievable experience in working with such countries as Jordania, Tashkent, Egipt, Uzbekistan, Sudan, Libia and Afganistan. From august 21st, 2012 he is working in Republic of Moldova. The Ambassador highlighted the major problems of the Republic of Moldova : corruption, lack of transparency in legal, political and economic fields and unattractive image of investment environment. As well, Mr. Meyer gave some suggestions to our officials regarding the political situation in our coutry.



An important belief or maybe opinon was given toward the actual situation of the European Union, the difficult situation of which is so much disputed last times. Mr. Ambassador Meyer underlined that European Union is very important for Germany and we should have clear ideas for long-run, and not judge event in short-run. This means European Union is and will be an engine in the future. As a conclusion, Mr. Meyer said the profession of ambassador is very complicated, because you should give up your personal life, devote yourself to solving nations' problems and not to forget to take into consideration the personal factors, which influence this profession a lot.

METTINGS AT HIGH LEVEL: GUNTHER KRICHBAUM-

THE CHAIRMAN OF THE BUNDESTAG'S EUROPEAN AFFAIRS COMMITTEE

On March 5th chairman of the Bundestag's European Affairs Committee, Gunther Krichbaum visited the Academy of Economic Studies. Best students from the IER faculty were honored to participate in the meeting and discussion with Mr Krichbaum. It is important to mention here that the European Affairs Committee is the central force for the German Bundestag's participation in European Union affairs. As a cross-sectorial committee it deals with fundamental questions of European integration, institutional matters and enlargement issues.

The chairman shared with the students his experience of working in the committee and also with his point of view concerning the Republic of Moldova's position and future perspectives. As concerns the integration of Moldova in the EU, the chairman is very optimist, he considers that our Republic is undoubtedly in Europe and should become a member of the Union. Consequently, reforms are needed in order to create new future in favour of people. Still, not only the reforms are important, but also the speed of implementing these changes (Moldova should move faster than the European "train").

The students of AESM had an opportunity to ask Mr Krichbaum intriguing questions they were concerned about most of all. Majority of the questions referred to his attitude towards Moldova's current economic and political situation, especially with the threat of dismission of the government in power. Current situation in political affairs disturbs European politicians. The Chairman expressed his concern relating the political instability in our country and about the incapacity of politicians to solve their problems within its framework, which shows that they are notable to solve the problems of people as well. Germany can help, moderate and support, but the problems inside the country should be solved independently. In addition Krichbaum suggested that Moldova has great basis for attracting foreign investments, creating legal security for long term perspectives in the future. Students were glad to find out that Germany has an interest in importing products from Moldova. Nevertheless, the issues of corruption and problems with tax authorities, unfortunately, still do exist.

Despite the difficulties that have been discussed with Gunther Krichbaum, the chairman assured our students that only with common forces we can help our country to step on further to reach our goals, because nobody knows our country better than us. None of the political and economic systems in the world is perfect, so for the Republic of Moldova it is possible and never too late to reach the higher standards and integrate into the European Union.
